In 2005 the IDF aligned itself with Ezer Mizion, signing a landmark agreement which enables every recruit to join the registry as part of their army induction. This collaboration constantly infuses the registry with young, healthy recruits from a broad spectrum of ethnic groups and genetic combinations, greatly expediting DNA matches for many cancer patients around the world. The IDF and Ezer Mizion are mutually honored by the lifesaving partnership which has transformed the Israeli army to a military that protects not only Israeli borders, but is saving Jewish lives around the world.



IDF Saves 1,700 Lives

1,799 transplants have taken place thanks to stem cell donations from registry members who joined as part of their IDF induction. The IDF's collaboration with Ezer Mizion's Bone Marrow Registry testifies to the deep mutual responsibility of Israel's citizens, which connects all segments of the nation. IDF soldiers who were found to be a match for a stem cell donation and volunteered to donate, without knowing anything about the patient, personify the Jewish Nation's trait of mutual responsibility. This is the secret of our existence and survival

Landmark:

In the course of the twenty years of the Registry's existence, 3,033 lifesaving bone marrow transplants took place. 3,033 men, women, and children, who, in their most difficult moments, received a second chance for life, thanks to a stem cell transplant. This milestone gives us the opportunity to look back with satisfaction and pride and to look ahead with renewed commitment and







This figure shows the number of active stem cell donors in the registry by year which directly impacts donor-patient matches and lifesaving transplants.

















Stem Cell Donor Age per Year

This chart reports the average stem cell donor age in Ezer Mizion's registry, according to the year of transplant. It shows how younger donors are consistently preferred and chosen by transplant centers due to the importance of age as a factor in transplant success outcomes.





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Destination Italy

A group of women with cancer went to Italy on a medically supervised trip as guests of Ezer Mizion. A packed five-day itinerary awaited the participants, including tours of Rome, Naples, and the Isle of Capri. One of the cancer patients, Michal Kleiner, a mother, raved: "The trip revived me and gave me new strength. Spending quality time and chilling with other women in my situation gives me a lot of energy. I understand that I'm not alone, and that is most important to me."



Cancer struck the Zoares family, not once but, twice. Tamar, the mother, has been fighting cancer for 13 years and is homebound. About a year ago, her son Shlomo was also diagnosed with cancer. When Shlomo reached his bar mitzvah this year, Ezer Mizion rallied to help the family make it a perfect event. Before the celebration, they helped Shlomo record singer Omar Adam's song, "Modeh Ani" at a professional recording studio. Shlomo was brought to his bar mitzvah by limousine, and Tamar participated in the festivities, transported by an Ezer Mizion ambulance.

Summer Camps and Retreats

This summer, once again, Ezer Mizion took children and young parents with cancer, together with their families and dozens of volunteers, to summer camp retreats. At camp, patients exchanged their treatment regimen for a variety of activities and fun experiences: jeep trips, gliding parachutes, releasing "my wish" balloons, performances by famous celebrities, and more. Dr. Bracha Zisser, Cancer Support Services Director commented: "The summer camps are a part of the extensive support network that Ezer Mizion operates for cancer patients and their families. The many moments of happiness seen at the summer camps are a testimony that we are doing everything we can to help those who need our support."





Celebrating Life

About 300 women who are fighting cancer on a daily basis — some of them as the patient, some coping with a sick spouse, and others caring for a child with cancer — took part in a "Mom's Pampering Day." At the "Dimol Platinum" hall, they were pampered with full makeup and manicure treatments, a professional photographer, a variety of craft workshops, and luxurious massages. The participants also enjoyed a gourmet meal and performances by famous celebs. But above all, quality time and detachment from their day-to-day challenges was the top priority

for this annual Ezer Mizion program. "This is an experience of unabated giving; the heart expands just from seeing what goes on here. Here, I feel the best, the healthiest, and the happiest," exclaimed Michal Madmon. Michal said this while serving as one of the many volunteer makeup artists who came to cheer up the women. "I had cancer six years ago, and Ezer Mizion helped and supported me, giving me a feeling of family, of a warm, loving home. For five years already, since I recovered, I've been coming back as an Ezer Mizion volunteer to give to other women."

Lighting Up Chanukah for the Patients

850 cancer patients and their families enjoyed a fabulous "Chanukah Happening." 15 buses from across Israel brought these families together. The adults and children exchanged hospital treatments for myriad fun activities. Chananya Chollak, International Chairman of Ezer Mizion, who attended the event, mingled with the families, encouraging, bolstering, supporting, and blessing the patients and their families that the joy of Chanukah, an auspicious time for miracles, should continue all year long.

Outing for Men with Cancer

A group of men with cancer went out for two days of quiet, peace, and an exhilarating experience in Mitzpeh Ramon. They gathered strength while enjoying the calm environment, visited the observatory in Mitzpeh Ramon, and enjoyed a jeep trip in the enchanting panorama of the Mitzpeh Ramon region.





Flew 6,200 Km to Save a Life


Roni Chen, 23, joined Ezer Mizion's Registry at his induction into the IDF. While he was on a post-service trip to India, he received a message that a patient in Israel who needed his stem cells was waiting for him. "I knew right away what I had to do. I started packing!" said Chen. "There was no deliberation of 'yes' or 'no.' It was clear that someone needed me to save his life. How many times in your life do you have such an opportunity?" Within a few days, he was back in Israel. "People tell me 'thank you,' but actually, I should been telling them 'thank you' for giving me the privilege to be part of the Registry and to save a life."



The Competitive Family

Barak and Ofek Schneider from Mazkeret Batya joined Ezer Mizion's Bone Marrow Donor Registry during their army induction. In 2015, Barak, 19, who was then serving in the IDF, was found to be a match for a patient. His oldest brother, Ofek, accompanied him through the process. The woman who received Barak's stem cell donation has recovered, but the two haven't yet met. "They told me that it's an older woman with leukemia. I know that my donation helped her and that she's alive. I'd be happy to meet her."

Fast forward to 2018. The two brothers returned to the hospital. This time it was 25 year old Ofek, a mechanical engineering student who came as the stem cell donor. "It took me by surprise! It's not the kind of phone call you get every day. The truth is that both I and my middle brother, Peleg, were found to be equally matching for the same patient, but I wanted to donate more than he did. I was more determined, so I was chosen as the lucky one. Maybe next time, it will be his turn and then all three of us will have donated stem cells and saved lives."



In December, the Israel Squash Championship took place. At 22 years old, Roy Avraham, was crowned Israel's champion. For him, the excitement that day was doubled: That very morning, he had started the process leading up to a stem cell donation for a patient who needed his stem cells to survive. A true champion!

Saving Lives Around the World

Not infrequently, a stem cell donation connects people from different parts of the world, who never would have met, had it not been for the genetic code unique just to them. Jonathan Sendzul, 53, from South Africa, received a stem cell donation from Liron Freiman, 30, an accountant and lawyer from Haifa, who'd joined Ezer Mizion's Registry when she joined the army. Her genetic testing was sponsored by the Brazil Community and she became a member of their donor pool. Freiman, married and mother of three, did not hesitate when she was asked to donate. Freiman's stem cells traveled over 4,300 miles, from Israel to South Africa and were transplanted into Sendzul's ailing body. Following his recovery, Sendzul came with his wife and family to Israel to meet Freiman and to thank her personally. The meeting between the two was highly emotional. "I was so happy to get a donation from Israel. Now we have a special connection, because her genes flow through me." Freiman summed it up: "It's an amazing feeling to save a life.






Mario and Guy Celebrate Together

Nine years ago, Mario Bruckman lost his daughter and – with her passing – his will to live. But when he was stricken with cancer, he decided to fight for his life. Thanks to Ezer Mizion, a matching stem cell donor was found for him: Guy Yisraeli Vered, at 22 years old, had just returned from his post army service trip. At their meeting, they discovered that they live near each other and that their birthdays are in the same month. The donation was made possible thanks to Mr. and Mrs. David and Sara Farajun, who'd sponsored Guy's lab testing (along with the lab testing for thousands of other soldiers). Immediately after their meeting, Mario and Guy made an emotional transatlantic call to David and Sara, who live in Canada, and thanked them.

University President Donates Stem Cells

Shortly after five year old Avishai Badleviev of Lod, was born, he was diagnosed with a rare form of anemia. The prognosis was dismal. At age two and a half, he had to undergo a stem cell transplant. "It was very hard. It isn't easy to see a child crying and not be able to help him," his father Yisrael recalls.

With the help of Ezer Mizion, a donor was found: Yaakov Gaon, vice-president of Ariel University. "I'm so happy to see that Avishai is well," said Gaon excitedly when the two met for the first time. "Before I was a bit nervous. What calmed me was the understanding that I was saving a life. That knowledge rallied me to the cause right away."



The Son Donated, Now the Mother Awaits a Donation

Irad Ohayon, 23, got a call from the Registry telling him that there was a perfect, rare match between him and a young man about his age. No'ad Jorno had a serious blood disease and needed a stem cell donation to survive. Due to the complexity of the patient's illness, the stem cell collection needed to be done from the pelvic bones under full anesthesia, another rarity. Ohayon didn't hesitate and, thanks to the perfect match, Jorno overcame his illness. Just a few days before the two met, Ohayon heard that his mother Sigal needs a kidney transplant. Ohayon prays that another person would have the same generosity of spirit as he had displayed: "When they asked me if I was willing to donate, I immediately agreed. Even though there was minimal discomfort, the chance of saving a life was so much more important. Now I only hope that a matching donor will be found who is willing to save my mother."

From the Alps to Ezer Mizion's Registry

Just before Matan Gera set off for the French Alps to work in a ski village, he got a message that he'd been found to be a match for a six-month old baby with leukemia. While waiting for compatibility confirmation Matan boarded a plane to France. Once the match was confirmed, more tests were needed. Volunteers from Ezer Mizion's Linked to Life International Volunteer Corps, which includes thousands of volunteers in hundreds of groups all over the world, rallied to draw blood for lab testing and coordinated the complex vial shipment from Gera up in the Alps to Israel.



Not Only Cancer...

Ivan Wolochik, a Ukrainian boy, was born healthy, but his health condition quickly deteriorated. He didn't gain weight, walk or talk, and didn't develop normally. Tests did not lead to a precise diagnosis. His parents sought solutions for him around the world, until they came to Hadassah Hospital, where they discovered that he was suffering from a very rare auto-immune syndrome. The only possible cure was a stem cell transplant. Thanks to Ezer Mizion, a donor was found: Lieutenant Oded Zand. Shortly before Zand had lost his cousin, Rabbi Nechemiah Lavi, in a terrorist attack. For Zand this was an opportunity to do something positive in his cousin's memory. The transplant was a success, and Ivan's family came from the Ukraine to meet Oded at Ezer Mizion. Zand's initial lab testing when he joined the registry was funded by Boeing Company. In its six years of existence, the Boeing Company Donor Pool has saved the lives of 11 patients around the world.



Social Media Blood Brothers

Tapping in to the power and scope of social media, before Rosh Hashanah Ezer Mizion spearheaded its Blood Brothers campaign where dozens and dozens of caring people undertook to serve as Blood Brother Hosts and raise funds via social media in support of Ezer Mizion's cancer support services. The campaign reached a climactic end on erev Yom Kippur, having reached a crescendo of enthusiastic support at this special time of year, drawing warm responses and enthusiastic support.





Golf – Swinging for Life

Golf enthusiasts joined Ezer Mizion tournaments that have become a tradition in the USA and Israel and are a significant funding source in support of the Registry and its patient support services. Seven years ago, tournament income established the "Hole-in-One" Donor Pool, which has so far saved the lives of 43 patients by facilitating lifesaving stem cell transplants. In 2018 Ezer Mizion hosted its first golf tournament in Ga'ash (Israel), its 9th annual tournament in Caesarea and a 6th golf and tennis tournament in New York. Special thanks to the golf committees of all three tournaments and to corporate sponsors and private philanthropists whose caring and generosity are saving lives!

Jerusalem Machaneh Yehuda Market Lands in London and Toronto

A festival of flavors and aromas greeted the guests at Shuk Machaneh Yehuda in London. No, it's no mistake; Jerusalem's beloved, charming marketplace traveled to London and then again to Toronto, for Ezer Mizion's exposure event to raise awareness about stem cell transplantation. The thousands of guests who came to the shuk both in London and in Toronto, enjoyed the refreshments and music, the aromas and a cacophony of sounds as they learned about Ezer Mizion's Bone Marrow Registry.



Uniting for the Future

Serving All Ethnicities

Despite the quantitative and qualitative expansion of the Registry over 20 years, there are still ethnic communities that are underrepresented in the Registry. This means that for patients in need of a stem cell donation from these communities, the future is not very bright. This is one of the challenges that lie before us. In recent years, large-scale campaigns were held to expand representation from among communities such as Yemen, Ethiopia, Iraq, Kurdistan, Georgia, and more.



The Ethiopian Community: "Save Workanash!"

Workanash, "pure gold" in Amharic, was born thirty years ago in Ethiopia, came on aliyah to Israel at age 4, and grew up in Netivot. She is currently working on her Master's degree in psychodrama. Her dream is to help people and to raise a family.

In March 2018, Workanash was diagnosed with acute leukemia and urgently needed a stem cell transplant to survive. Since the number of donors of Ethiopian origin in the Registry was so low and no match was found, the only solution was to embark on a nationwide donor recruitment campaign to save her life. From the moment the campaign started, the entire Ethiopian community joined in one common mission: "Save Workanash!"

Through the campaign a matching stem cell donor was found and Workanash's life was saved. But that's not the end of the story. Thanks to Ezer Mizion's campaign, the lives of additional patients of Ethiopian origin have been saved. With the critical awareness created within the Ethiopian Community about the importance of stem cell transplants and their role in this lifesaving process, Ezer Mizion looks forward to helping many more in need.

"The most challenging aspect of my illness was to understand that I was dependent on people for every little thing. From being an independent young woman, I turned into a helpless person. To my good fortune, I was blessed. From the moment I was diagnosed with cancer, I felt that there were people around me who cared about me. The entire community rallied. Thousands of people joined Ezer Mizion's Registry in an effort to save me. I am so happy to be here, thanks to Ezer Mizion. We are all blessed that we can together be part of this marvelous journey to save lives."

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The Yemenite Community and Roni

Shortly before her wedding, Roni Cohen, 27, learned that she had cancer and would need a stem cell transplant. Because of her rare genetic combination, her doctors all but gave up. With the help of her friends and family, Ezer Mizion launched a campaign to find a donor for Roni. Publicity and social media called upon people of Yemenite-Moroccan or Yemenite-North African extraction, matching Roni's background, to join the Registry. In a massive show of compassion, over 16,200 people came forward and joined the Registry, many of them from the Yemenite community that, until Roni's campaign, had not had broad representation in the Registry. As the drive ended, Dr. Bracha Zisser, Registry Director, said, "It was amazing to see so many people rallying on behalf of Roni, giving her and other patients hope. This is our people at their finest hour."

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
Stem Cell Harvesting Center

After years of thought about how to improve the stem cell donor's experience, Ezer Mizion inaugurated its own Stem Cell Harvesting Center.

Dedicated by David and Sara Farajun, the center's inauguration was attended by Health Minister Yaakov Litzman; Chananya Chollak, Ezer Mizion International Chairman; Dr. Bracha Zisser, Ezer Mizion Bone Marrow Registry Director; and Professor Isaac Yaniv, Ezer Mizion Registry Medical Director.

The medical staff operating the center includes a doctor, nurses, medical technicians, and a director. Stem cell harvesting takes place at Ezer Mizion's Center in keeping with the highest standards to provide the highest-quality stem cells.

Ezer Mizion's eye to the future is to continue working for the benefit of the donors and recipients and to do everything so that the process will take place under the best and safest conditions possible.



Total people assisted

Cancer therapy treatments take place in hospitals on an outpatient basis, whenever possible. In Israel, several major children's oncology units are located around the Tel Aviv area. Young cancer patients who live in other parts of the country would have to travel hours every day for their outpatient treatments. Children who have to endure the ravages of chemotherapy and radiation are exhausted. They are further debilitated by the hours they have spent every day on the road to and from the difficult treatments.

This all changed in 1996. Ezer Mizion, with the generous assistance of the Bracha & Moti Zisser Foundation, Andrew & Margaret

Rosinger, and Israel's National Insurance Institute, opened Oranit, a guest home away from home for cancer patients and their families.

Located in Petach Tikvah, near Israel's major oncology centers, Oranit spares families from exhausting daily trips for brief treatment sessions. These families are referred to Ezer Mizion by doctors, nurses or social workers at hospitals where they are undergoing cancer therapy.

In addition to the 18 spacious and comfortable suites of the Andrew and Margaret Rosinger Residential Wing, Oranit has a dining hall, an auditorium, a synagogue, the Rinat Bakshi Wildlife Pavilion and an extensive program of recreational and emotional therapy activities at its Donald Berman Rehabilitation Center.

In contrast to hospitals and treatment, Oranit is a beautiful, happy place where families can relax and spend quality time together in spite of the health crisis they are undergoing. Ezer Mizion hosting at Oranit and cancer support services are provided free of charge to the cancer patient and all immediate family members: for pediatric cancer patients; parents and siblings; for adult cancer patients; spouses and children.



Setting Up a Personalized Donor Pool

When a match is sought for a patient in need of a stem cell transplant, the blood samples at Ezer Mizion's Registry are checked to determine compatibility between the patient and the potential donor's blood, and Ezer Mizion provides the stem cells that

have facilitated thousands of lifesaving transplants.

Stem cell testing sponsors can set up a personalized donor pool in Ezer Mizion's main Registry, bearing the name of their choice. This personalized pool includes all the potential stem cell donors whose initial tissue typing was funded by the sponsor, which enabled them to join the Registry.

Upon its initial testing, every blood sample is given a tracking code and the sponsored codes are entered into the personalized pool where they are constantly monitored. Personalized donor pool sponsors are notified when a lifesaving stem cell transplant is carried out from their pool, sharing the exciting news that they have been instrumental in saving a patient's life.

Supporting Ezer Mizion's Registry is an "insurance policy" for everyone. A completely compatible donor is not something that can be bought with money. Illness does not differentiate between rich or poor, young or old. The Registry is vital for you, for me, for the people we love and for the entire Jewish Nation.

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
